# DIRECTOR'S NOTE

Thank you for being here! We're finding something together. What is it?!

Hadley Camilus, Associate Dean of Multicultural Affairs, speaks about the New Plays Ensemble as an *Opportunity*, and I hear Lauren Josef, Chair of Theater & Dance, say *Experiment*. And I'm like: *Yes, let's collaborate! I'm in!* 

I hear the ways these intentions + the voices of the twenty students who have shared the Actors Lab space this term are calling for conversation and creation. The genesis for New Plays Ensemble was within a New Play Reading Series led by former Theater Instructor Sarah Ream in collaboration with Hadley Camilus. Their work together was born from a shared desire to expand the existing curriculum with greater diversity of voices and stories being read and performed at Exeter. Joining the Theater & Dance Department this fall with a background in acting and new play development, I'm sharing in that vision. And I'm asking how we can open up the invitation and commitment even more. *How do we take that impulse in me or you that says: Yes! I'm in! and make it real, concrete, practical – you know, that thing we try to do in theater – breathe into it, give it life.* 

We're striving to develop the New Plays Ensemble as an inclusive, equitable space that centers the work of BIPOC playwrights and LGBTQ+ playwrights and also honors the individual identities and interests of the students within the group. We do this together. In community.

We've been reading both published + unpublished pieces from living playwrights. Embedded within our rehearsal process has been a *Guest Artist Series*. Playwrights have visited with us for conversations via Zoom, during the week that we've been exploring their plays. We've been able to talk about writing and new play development as a dynamic, collaborative process. *We heard playwrights speak about their families, their communities and why they make art.* And conversations with playwrights are happening on campus, too. An exciting artistic collaboration is emerging between Sinna Oumer and Dr. Sahar Ullah, a playwright and new instructor in the English Department. Sinna will perform two pieces from Dr. Ullah's the *Hijabi Monologues* tonight! We'd like you to know that some of the material we're sharing is intense, with characters who are hurting, volatile, violent. Several pieces reference our world's oppressive, painful past and unconscionable present. We've had some challenging conversations and complicated decisions about how to read, how to stage, what to perform. There are notes in the program that identify scenes with potentially triggering content. Please feel free to come and go from the performance, as you wish. Please talk with folks after the show and share your responses. *We want to hear your voices.* 

I'm thinking about playwright Brian Granger sharing with us about how he writes characters for his mother and grandmother. I'm remembering Brian talking about their love of sci-fi and pop-culture and musicals, about growing up in Ohio and using both he and they pronouns. They smile as they tell us about identifying as Black and gay and religious and an artist. Brian's laughing with us, like: *"Yeah! Those things can all intersect! They do!"* There's pain and joy and love in Brian's voice and eyes all at the same time.

On the stage tonight, we're trying to give voice to Brian's words and the words of many other playwrights. *Thank you for being with us.*  $\clubsuit$


